# Our School Development Partner

We were visited earlier this month by our School Development Partner (our SDP) for their termly visit. As a very experienced former headteacher and school advisor, she is able to skilfully identify those areas where our actions are having tangible success and also offer advice on how we can make our school even better.

Her feedback from the visit focused on our curriculum and our Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) provision.

On our maths and outdoor learning curriculum she noted:

- The delivery of the curriculum enables them to know more and remember more, because they are taught content that specifically builds on their prior knowledge.
- In maths, the vast majority of pupils are currently working securely at year group expectations with a quarter working above year group expectations.
- During a pupil activity, all pupils demonstrated resilience.
- Meaningful outdoor learning opportunities that will support pupils to retain and apply key knowledge from across the curriculum.

- Pupils speak enthusiastically about the positive impact of learning outside the classroom and staff report numerous benefits to delivering lessons outside.
- Benefits of outdoor learning include:
  - Improvements in pupils' confidence and wellbeing, resulting in them being more motivated and eager to learn.
  - $\circ~$  Pupils having a growing appreciation of nature and interest in protecting it.
  - Learning is more inclusive, catering for different learning styles. Staff understand that pupils learn in different ways and for some, especially for children with special educational needs, learning outside the classroom can support them to manage stress.
  - Curriculum learning has been enhanced, because delivering lessons in a practical way is making concepts easier to understand and more memorable.
  - $\circ~$  Outdoor learning is also enhancing problem solving, teamwork and thinking skills.

On our SEND provision she identified that:

- We put strategies in place to support groups and individual pupils, especially around transition points, where their social and emotional needs have been identified as a barrier to their learning.
- The school's SENCo, has the relevant mandatory qualification and significant expertise in effectively supporting high quality outcomes for pupils with SEND.
- Pupils with SEND get a broad curriculum offer and the delivery of the curriculum enables them to know more and remember more, because they are taught content that specifically builds on their prior knowledge.
- Leaders have emphasised the importance of an ethos and environment that promotes trust and respect, with empathy for individual circumstances and a flexible approach to meeting specific needs.

The visit concluded with observations that Southridge has a "golden thread" running through it, with our pupils at its centre and a clear objective to help them develop to be the best version of themselves that they can be.

# STEM Week

The children accessed and enjoyed a wide range of wonderful learning opportunities during our STEM week, where Mrs Pringle had carefully designed activities and visitors to develop children's critical thinking skills and understanding of science, technology, engineering and maths, all under the umbrella of caring for our environment and recognising our impact upon it.

The week included:

- A visit by Sarah Elkin of OASES (Outdoor And Sustainability Education Specialists) who spoke to all the children about the impact of climate change on our planet and what we can do to help.
- Workshops on Green Skills including Wind Turbine Design with Dan Smith of Newcastle College.

- Nature Mapping workshops led by Fiona Greenwold of Education Nature Parks and the Royal Horticultural Society.
- A range of interesting 'Scientists of the Day' including Fangxian Fang, Dr Emanuele Bevacqua and Dr Rabi Chhantyal-Pun whose work showed children how some scientists are working to help improve the health of the planet.
- A wonderful day with Dr Meryl "Doccy B" Batchelder where every year group tackled a different "Big Question" such as *What does it take to make a cup of tea*? and learnt to think more deeply about the world around them. This included the children presenting their findings to the rest of the school at the end of the day.

We hope the children came home enthused and eager to share some of what they had learned.

# Our Social Ambassadors

We have been excited to launch our Social Ambassador initiative this half-term. This is designed to show our children some of the things that people do to make a positive impact on our local society and more widely. So far this term we have been visited by Nick Smith, a sports coach and advocate for children's mental health, who talked to the children about how his sports work impacts positively for both the people involved and also himself. He then got the children to think about what new exercise they could do to have a positive impact on themselves and how they could involve others to have a positive impact on them.

We have also been joined by Ross Lowrie, the Net-Zero Lead for the North East Combined Authority. As our Ambassador for the Environment, he told the children about North East England's world leading offshore wind farms where each rotation of the huge turbine's blades creates enough electricity to power a whole household for two days. He was very impressed to hear that the children are already actively involved in making our own compost, and suggested that two further things we could do to have a positive impact on the environment would be to try and travel to school without using a car, and to make some bug hotels for our school environment's smallest inhabitants. Everyone agreed that we would give it our best go!

We have also been joined by our Ambassador for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, Hilary Davies, who talked to the children about her work in South Africa Next term from our Community Ambassadors from the local Rotary Club.

# World Book Day

The children had a wonderful time celebrating World Book Day. They needed little encouragement to share their love of stories and enthusiasm for books. Miss McIntyre had organised a super day with a focus on Emma Carlisle's book, "What do you see when you look at a tree?" This led to all sorts of wonderful work, from Haikus to Andy Goldsworthy style artwork. The children even created a school story with each class writing a section and involving all the children from Reception to Year 4. Here's an excerpt from "Charlotte and the Wish-Orbs" to whet your appetites:

"As the storm raged, Charlotte, the last protector of the ancient oak tree, grabbed her rucksack and ran out of her house, her red, curly hair whipping around her face in the wind. Although she was only six years old, Charlotte knew she would need all her strength and courage to keep the tree safe.

Far away in the distance, a fierce dragon roared angrily. Charlotte froze. Bravely, she raced across the dark, dense forest until she reached the ancient oak tree. Above her, stars blinked, and trees moaned as the fiery dragon soared swiftly through the night sky."

# School Council

At the start of the Autumn Term, and at the Spring Half-term we hold elections in school for the children in each class to choose their new School Council representatives. The School Council then meet regularly with Mrs Dunn to help guide school developments and priorities and ensure that the

pupils' voice is heard. One of the first jobs the School Council have at this time of year is to choose the charity that we will support over the forthcoming twelve months. Having previously supported an international animal charity (Four paws) and a local environmental charity (Northumberland Wildlife Trust), the School Council unanimously decided that this year we will be supporting the Lily Foundation (<u>www.thelilyfoundation.org.uk/charity/what-we-do/lilys-story/</u>). The children were particularly keen to support this charity as it will have a positive impact for Miss Heads' little boy Leo, who was born last January with Mitochondrial Disease. The children's feelings of care, compassion and community have made us very proud.

We also need to give a special mention to Charlotte's dad Simon who gave the school two days of very hard labour and doubtless needed a good long rest over the weekend!

They have also been feeding "Christie", "Colin" and "Mr Christopher Nibbles" our school composters with left over fruit and vegetables (and egg cartons) so that raised beds will be packed with nutrients for next year's growing season. They have also been keeping our bird feeders topped up. What superstars! 
