Routines



- School drop-off is from 8:40 8:50. Year 3 children cross the yard with their adult and enter through the Year 3 entrance doors.

 - 2.00-2.10pm afternoon break
 - 3.20pm end of the school day.

Attendance

Attendance Guidance				
Percentage	Judgement	Comment		
100%	Outstanding	Perfect Attendancel A child has the very best chance of success in their learning.		
96,1-99,9%	Excellent	Fantastic Attendancel The is above the minimum government expected national target. This gives a child the best chance in their learning.		
96%	Good	Good Attendancel This meet the minimum government expected national average target for them to learn well.		
93-95,9%	Below Average	Below Average Attendance. This attendance does not meet the minimum government expected national average target. This may affect their learning in school and is a concern.		
90,1-92,9%	Poor	Poor Attendance. This is well below the government's minimum expected national average target and is very close to a 'persistent absence' status. This is a significant concern as a child's progress in school may be affected.		
90% or below	Very Poor	Very Poor Attendance. This attendance is categorised as that of a 'persistent absentee'. This is an unacceptable level of attendance and is a serious concern.		

(Lateness is recorded. If an absence falls below 90%, the pupil is classed as a persistent absentee. Government guidance is therefore no holidays should be taken in term time. It is suggested if a pupil misses 2 weeks from every academic year, they will lose a whole year's education altogether!)









We are available at the Year 3 entrance each morning if you need to pass on a quick message.



If your child is in Breakfast Club, a message can be left with the staff or the main school office - we will always endeavour to get back to you by the end of the school day.



We know that getting in touch can be more difficult for working parents, so we are also available via email – addresses at the end of this presentation.

- The children will have lots of opportunities to work with other children on shared projects and activities mix-up days.



Reading




- Reading book bags to come to school EVERY DAY.
- Space is at a premium and so we ask that the children use book bags rather than bulky backpacks.
- In Year 3 we work hard to encourage children to develop a love of reading through free choice readers.
- In addition to this, we read daily to the children from a range of children's books and authors.
- On a given day they will read their guided reading book with their group,
 with specific teaching from the teacher.
- A parental signature each week is much appreciated.

Children's Storytime Favourites: Year 3 & Year 4 (Ages 7, 8, 9)

Spelling

- Spelling is taught weekly, and the skills practiced daily.
- Children will practice independently as part of 'early work'.
- Children will practice more formally as part of daily literacy lessons.
- Teachers will assess progress by monitoring children's work, and through a half-termly test.
- Practice can still take place at home through Spelling Shed, but there will be no weekly test.









Outdoor Learning



This year, we have taken our learning outside with lots of exciting lessons going on in the various areas around school. From Stone Age shelters in history to angle hunts in maths, we have been out whatever the weather!

• There are so many benefits to outdoor learning and research has shown it can support well-being as well as improve engagement.

· Could we please ask that if you have any spare wellies, that you send them in at the beginning of the year so that the children can be out

Maths



In newsletters, children will be given a range of useful websites which can be used to support
home learning of times tables and the maths skills help children to practise facts which are
crucial to their development of further maths skills. We will supplement this as the year
progresses with games and activities to help consolidate learning.

By the end of Year 4, the expectation is that children know all their times tables

so, your child will have continued access to their TTRS account.







How can I support my child at home?

Homework

- Extended homework set on Thursday, must be returned on a Monday
- Only 1 hour max per week
- Encourage independent learning
- Project homework set half termly linked to topics. Extended projects e.g. Making a round house or rainforest or researching a Mega City.
- Children should also be encouraged to read daily and be using Times Table Rockstars for 10 minutes per day.



PE



 We are timetabled to have two PE lessons per week although this may, from time to time, be changed due to events in school and the British weather. We will let you know our PE days at the start of next term.

 PE bags are to be kept in school with all items CLEARLY labelled. (New smaller back packs are available from Anne Thomas in Whitley Bay.)

 Jogging trousers or leggings will be needed for outdoor PE lessons. Trainers are also recommended for our Daily Mile.

No earrings or jewellery should be worn for PE.

 We are also very lucky to have sports coaches who come and lead various sessions with sports such as dodgeball on offer.

PSHE – Relationships Education

- Relationships education is compulsory in all primary schools.
- We are a first school, and the focus of our curriculum is on the children
- children will be taught the real names of parts of their body so that it supports the safeguarding of children if required.

- Developing healthy and respectful relationships. Families and people who care for me
- Caring friendships
- Respectful relationships
- Online relationships
- Being Safe








Jigsaw

- At Southridge we use the Jigsaw scheme to deliver Relationships Education.
- We have adapted the scheme to fit our school context a first school (not primary) and the age and emotional maturity of our children.
- Jigsaw is delivered through six units of work across the year each piece of the jigsaw fits together to give our children an overall picture of a healthy and respectful relationship.



• It also fosters healthy and respectful peer to peer communication and behaviour between boys and girls.

(You can view our Relationships Education curriculum on our school website and is neatly intertwined with our Jigsaw Program across the year, our core values and our weekly assemblies.)



Clubs



A variety of clubs are available after school throughout the year.

(Football, choir, art club, cricket, chess and many others!)

- All clubs run for 5 weeks prior to and 5 weeks after a half term holiday (Term length permitting).
- Some clubs are run by teachers so places and payments for those happen 'in house'. Places are awarded on a first come, first served basis.
- Once a child has signed up for a club, we ask that you support them in completing the whole 5 sessions, even if it
 is not initially to their taste. Club payments are non-refundable.
- Other clubs are run by outside providers e.g. Star Strike football places and payments are organised by them.
- Look out for club notifications on your School Gateway app.



Medicines


- Medicines can only be administered in school if they have been prescribed by a medical professional, and the first dose has already been administered at home.
- All medicines must be brought to the school office and the necessary paperwork completed by a parent or carer.
- Medicines will be stored in a locked cabinet or fridge.
- A record will be kept of the dosages given and the time they were administered for medicines which are short term e.g. antibiotics
- Consent and a care plan must be given for use of long-term medicines in school e.g. epi-pen or inhaler.
- Long term medications such as epi-pens must be kept in date. Out-ofdate medicines will be returned to you.
