#### Clothes Sorting

- By Colour: Group clothes into piles of similar colours (e.g., reds, blues, greens).
- By Person: Create separate sections or baskets for each family member's clothes.

### Cutlery Sorting

- Use drawer dividers or small containers:
  - o Forks in one section
  - Spoons in another
  - Knives in their own space

### Toy Organization

- By Type:
  - Soft toys vs. hard toys
- By Colour:
  - o Group toys into colour categories
- By Owner:
  - o "All of my toys go here" vs. "All of [Name]'s toys go there"

Sensory play is vital for child development. It fosters brain growth, enhances cognitive skills like memory and problem-solving, and supports the development of fine and gross motor skills, language, and emotional regulation. Through hands-on exploration, children build essential neural connections, learn to understand cause and effect, expand their vocabulary, and develop the ability to manage their emotions.

This seasonal setup not only celebrates autumn but also encourages creativity, curiosity, and meaningful learning through play.



Following children's interests is a powerful approach to learning and development. When we tune into what children are naturally curious about, we create meaningful, engaging experiences that support growth across all areas.



#### Exploring Through Play: Cars, Bridges, and Ramps


This week, the children have been deeply engaged in imaginative and investigative play using cars. They've built **bridges**, **tunnels**, and **ramps**, experimenting with different materials and designs to test how the cars move.

Through this hands-on exploration, they discovered:

- Which cars travel most reliably
- Which ones are the fastest
- Which cars don't fit under the bridges

This activity beautifully supports STEM learning, encouraging children to think critically, test hypotheses, and solve problems. It also promotes fine motor development, spatial awareness, and collaborative play.
