They were so well behaved, helpful and kind, a real credit to you all.

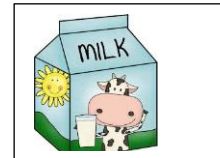
Meanwhile in book bags are the consolidating materials that match the stages so far for your child's books.

While assessments are taking place to ascertain whether your child is ready to move on please keep encouraging sound talk in their heads and learning those tricky words.

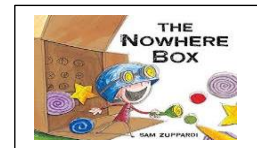
We would love to receive your observations about which words they have managed to blend out and about at the pool, shopping or around the house.

In Number work this week children have been given the opportunity to learn some counting in twos songs and show case their knowledge.

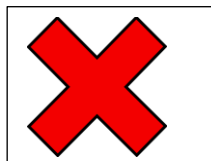
