On Thursday 11th November all the children in school came, in their class groups, to the front of school where they each helped to plant 2000 crocus bulbs (kindly purchased by the PTA) which will hopefully form a lovely herald of spring for anyone walking past school or coming across the zebra crossing once winter begins to loosen its grip.

In conjunction with discussions around Remembrance and COP26, we discussed how one small crocus on its own (rather like one small voice) could easily be overlooked or lost, but by all working together towards a common goal we will hopefully produce something unmissable. Everyone planted their bulbs carefully to follow the design that the School Council had produced and one small voice wondered whether it would really look like that when the flowers finally come out. Review of Education at Southridge

As you may be aware, in September the government announced that schools with a current 'Outstanding' judgement would no longer be exempt from Ofsted inspections and that they would aim to prioritise visiting those schools who had waited longest since their last inspection. As Southridge was last inspected by Ofsted in 2007, we can expect to be a priority for a visit. Since our last inspection, Southridge has implemented a rigorous system of school improvement through both the Local Authority and private sector. This has helped us to ensure that we have not stood still and that we have constantly aimed to improve the educational provision and experience for all of our children. During a recently commissioned review of our Quality of Education by an educational consultant and former HMI (Her Majesty's Inspector of Schools) the feedback highlighted our ambitious curriculum, the rapid pace of learning and high achievement relative to the age and ability of our children.

While our school's governing body, senior leadership team and staff recognise that the school has continually challenged ourselves, moved forward and striven for excellence, we are aware that the criteria by which Ofsted grades schools have changed considerably since our previous inspection. Since the routine inspection of 'Outstanding' schools recommenced last half term, nationally almost 75% of those schools have seen their judgement lowered and only one primary school has retained their outstanding judgement

(<u>www.schoolsweek.co.uk</u>). As such, we are realistic that while we expect any inspection team to see the strength of our children, staff and school community, that the margins separating 'Outstanding' and 'Good' are extremely fine. We can assure you that we will always strive to ensure your children have the best possible start in education and are given a school experience that allows them to be the very best that they can be.

Our Amazing Athletes

Before the half term break we were able to send four teams of runners from Year 3 and Year 4 to a Cross Country Race event for schools across the North East's Local Authorities. Each team of six raced against approximately 150 other children from private and state schools across the region.

The children did amazingly well with individuals recording top ten finishes in all four categories. A special mention must go to Noah and Ada Penfold who both won their respective races for Year 4 boys and Year 3 girls, and also for the Year 3 girls team who finished in first place overall for their category. Considering the strength and depth of the competition these represent amazing accomplishments. We hope you join us in extending our congratulations to all of the boys and girls who did such a wonderful job in representing Southridge.

Building a spirit of enquiry Our Geography and History curriculum are based around an Enquiry approach where the children are encouraged to pose questions about their learning and then use, adapt and develop their skills as they work together to find the answers. This aims to develop a deep and rich understanding of the curriculum knowledge and skills that build throughout their time here at Southridge and provide an excellent foundation as they move up to Middle School. This curriculum learning begins in an integrated form in the Early Years and while the children in Reception were enjoying their Autumn ramble before half term they were taking first steps along a journey in Geography which will take them, before they leave Southridge, to all the different continents of the world, as well as a greater understanding of their local area.

Year 1 were kindly invited to visit St Mary's Church. They impressed their teachers, helpers and hosts with their impeccable behaviour, interesting questions and depth of knowledge. Well done!

Reception impressed everyone with their very grown up sensible walking when they went out to explore Beaumont Park's 'backtrack' on their Autumn Ramble. Then afterwards used the experience to take their first steps in map making.
