

Moving into a new key stage is an exciting time and you'll learn lots of fascinating new things. Here's a flavour of what to expect in year 3.

Year 3

Mathe

- In maths, you will:
- Solve problems and practise how to add and subtract
 3-digit numbers using the column method.
 - Continue to build on your times tables knowledge from year 2 and learn the 3, 4 and 8 times tables.
- Explore fractions and learn how to add and subtract fractions with the same denominator.
- Learn how to tell the time using analogue, digital and 24-hour clocks.
- Practise measuring the perimeter of (the distance all the way around) a 2D shape.
- Investigate angles and recognise them as a measure of a turn.

Englishe

- In year 3, you will:
- Be encouraged to read a wide range of different types of books, including poetry, plays and non-fiction books. You'll answer questions and give your opinion about what you've read, starting to justify your views by referring to the text.
- Continue to work on your handwriting, making sure your letters are joined up.
 - Work on how to plan and structure your stories, describing characters and settings in detail in your writing.
- Work on sentence structure, using conjunctions such as **when, so** and **because** to create longer sentences.
 - Learn how to organise your writing into paragraphs.
 - Practise using inverted commas to punctuate direct speech.
- Continue to practise spelling techniques and learn the statutory spelling words for year 3.





What to Expect the









There are so many amazing things to learn about in science this year.

Topics include:

Plants - You'll study the different parts of flowering plants and investigate the requirements plants need for life and growth.

Animals, including humans - During this topic, you'll learn about how muscles and skeletons help animals and humans to move, support and protect them. You'll also look at nutrition - the types of food animals and humans need to survive.

Rocks - You'll study different types of rocks and learn how fossils are formed.

Light - You'll investigate how light is reflected from surfaces and learn how shadows are formed.

Forces and magnets - You'll observe how things move on different surfaces and how magnets attract and repel each other. You'll also learn how magnets attract some materials but not others.

You'll be able to step

you study a range of
fascinating history
topics this year. Topics
in year 3 vary between
schools but you could be
finding out all about Britain
during the Stone Age, Bronze
Age and Iron Age or learning
about the Roman Empire and
its impact on British society.

You might discover fascinating facts about the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons or study an early civilisation, such as the ancient Egyptians or the ancient Greeks. You might find out about a non-European society too, such as the Maya people or the early Islamic civilization. Whatever you study, there's plenty to look forward to.

Geography

In geography, you'll continue to locate the world's countries on a map as well as to name and locate counties and cities in the United Kingdom. Topics in year 3 vary between schools but you might study the physical features of the UK, including hills, mountains, coasts and rivers. Further afield, you might learn all about volcanoes and earthquakes. You might also

might learn all about volcanoes and earthquakes. You might also find out about world climate zones and biomes, such as rainforests, deserts and grasslands as well as look at the distribution of the world's natural resources, including energy and food.





Think about the positives that may happen.


